Visitors were no longer welcome at the Kernsville Dam. People were not permitted to fish from it's banks, explore it's trials or swim from it's shores. True, the basin and it's trails remained open and welcome to visitors; and also true, a few people did risk (and some of those did receive) citations and fines to swim in the reservoir's waters or dive from The Rock. But the summer was, for better or worse, a quiet one.

For Blue Mountain Wildlife, the summer's programs at the Kerny ended with the Run To The Rock Trail Races, only three days into the summer. BMW did host the annual Dragonfly Walk in the basin in August, and participated in the Taste of Hamburg-er Festival on Labor Day Saturday. Joe Swider did maintain his one-man trash collection efforts throughout the summer months, collecting trash left by those who ignored the "No Trespassing" signs. But the traditional summer efforts of Blue Mountain Wildlife were not to be seen.

Instead, BMW busied itself with planning and coordinating. The I-78 widening project provided BMW with some interesting opportunities to improve the basin and Monument Parking Lot. Much work during many meetings with many groups over many months have gone into the plans for the basin. And the process is still not complete. We hope to present the final plans at our Annual Membership Meeting and Banquet in January.

Mckenzie Greenawalt's Girl Scout project also provids BMW a wonderful opportunity to both create a second butterfly garden to temporarily replace the one near the Kernsville Dam and to improve the area around the Information Kiosk and DS Trail. BMW is combining this project with donations of three concrete benches and a concrete picnic table. We're all looking forward to seeing this project come to fruition next year.

With all of this good work in process, Blue Mountain Wildlife could use some volunteers to step up and dedicate time to helping out the Kerny. There are a few openings on the Board of Directors that need to be filled in January. If you care about the Kerny and can dedicate one evening a month, please consider joining the Board and helping us make the big decisions.


#### **WALKING WITH DRAGONFLIES**



#### **IMPROVEMENTS AT THE MONUMENT PARKING LOT**

On September 12th, work started on the long-planned improvements to the Monument Parking Lot area. The first phase of the improvements includes three benches to be installed along the DS Trail and a picnic table and native plant butterfly garden immediately north of the parking lot. The first pads were poured for a picnic table and portapotties, as was a pedestal for the plaque for the picnic table. Barry Shollenberger readied the site and Hartz Concrete poured the pads. Reading Pre-

cast then installed the concrete picnic table, which was donated by Lifetime Member Katherine Wells in honor of her parents, Gus and Caryl Wells.

As work continues through the winter and into the spring, three more pads will be poured for the three benches to be installed overlooking the basin along the DS Trail. Girl Scout Mckenzie Greenawalt will be working to install a native plant butterfly garden in the area around the picnic table.













#### COMING THIS WINTER

With winter almost here, Blue Mountain Wildlife is looking to the future. The work at the Kerny is pretty much done for the year, although there may still be more done, if the weather cooperates. There are two Scout projects underway—Mckenzie Greenawalt's butterfly garden at the Monument Parking Lot and Ryan Kemp's restoration of the two Outdoor Classrooms at the north end of the basin. Both are expected to be complete early next year.

A much bigger project is getting underway that will have a large impact on the desilting basin. The I-78 Widening Project has been planned for the highway east of PA Route 61. The widening to six lanes will impact the basin in two ways: the I-78 bridge will see additional

spans to accommodate the two additional lanes on the south side of the bridge over the basin and the Schuylkill River; and the removal of wetlands in the Lenhartsville area to accommodate the widening there will result in the construction of an additional 2.5 acres of wetlands in the northern half of the basin. The plans for the wetlands work are being finalized now. work is slated to occur in the fall of 2018 and will impact the trail system during construction. However, the work is planned to result in significant improvements to the trail system and Monument Parking Lot when it is complete. BMW has been involved with the planning and is looking forward to the approval and implementation of the final plans next year.







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
